

Dr. Gaston Cedillo is a leading transportation and logistics expert, recognized for his innovative application of the 'Physical Internet' concept to optimize cross-border freight flows within the USMCA framework. As the Technical Director of the National Laboratory for Transportation Systems & Logistics at the Mexican Institute of Transportation (IMT), Dr. Cedillo spearheads groundbreaking research and the development of best practices in the logistics sector.

His work addresses the challenges of 'Nearshoring' and supply chain regionalization between the U.S. and Mexico, while also shaping the future of logistics through pioneering projects. These include the creation of Latin America's first GPS-based collective intelligence logistics platform for the trucking industry, the first autonomous drone for freight deliveries, and the first Urban Logistics Living Lab.

Dr. Cedillo is also the Scientific Chairman of the International Congress on Logistics and Supply Chain (CiLOG), where his thought leadership continues to influence industry and academic audiences across the Americas and Europe. His extensive research and practical insights are invaluable for decision-makers navigating the dynamic logistics landscape.

Daniel Covarrubias is the Director of the Texas Center for Border Economic and Enterprise Development at the A.R. Sanchez, Jr. School of Business at Texas A&M International University (TAMIU). The Texas Center supports private and public entities with research, knowledge, and assistance in border and binational socio-economic development. It also hosts the TAMIU Logistechs Living Lab, a facility focused on improving cross-border trade and transportation through exponential technologies and fostering public-private partnerships for innovation.

Before joining the Texas Center, Daniel led the Centro de Innovación Socieconómica y Tecnológica (Centro IST), where he helped businesses, from SMEs to Fortune 500 companies, enhance their competitiveness and develop new business models through innovation and technology. Daniel is a member of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Transportation Research Board's Standing Committee on International Trade and Transportation and serves on several other key industry committees. His research focuses on Cross-Border Regional Development, Clusters, Regional Innovation Systems, and Logistechs—technologies that transform logistics by improving goods transport, handling, and customs clearance.

As a leading voice on Logistechs and cross-border trade, Daniel frequently contributes to media outlets like the Wall Street Journal, Texas Standard, and PBS. He holds a Ph.D. in Business Competitiveness and Economic Development from Deusto Business School in Spain, an MA in Political Science from TAMIU, an MBA from the University of Texas at San Antonio, and a BBA from Monterrey Tec.

Prior to joining Sunset, Jose spent 12 years at Transplace, where he co-founded Transplace Mexico, growing it from the ground up to 850 employees and managing 120,000 annual cross-border shipments. He played a key role in Transplace's merger with Laser Forwarding, a leading Mexican customs broker, in 2017. His leadership earned Transplace Mexico a CSCMP Logistics Innovation Award in 2012.


